5. Secretariat matters

Staff Regulations

On 24 June 2022, Aotearoa New Zealand celebrated Matariki as an official public holiday for the first time. This public holiday is the first public holiday in New Zealand to recognise Te Ao Māori, and the first new public holiday since Waitangi Day became a public holiday in 1974. The calendar date for this public holiday will shift each year to align with the Māori lunar calendar and will always fall on a Friday either in June or July.

The current Staff Regulations did not foresee the development of a new public holiday for New Zealand and now refer to a public holiday whose title has changed (King's birthday). Next year the Secretariat intends to suggest updates to the Staff regulations that will include amending the public holidays list.

Recently, New Zealand rental prices¹ for accommodation have risen significantly alongside general cost of living expenses and a weakened New Zealand dollar. This combination of stressors is increasingly bringing uncertainty, instability, and pressure onto staff and needs to be considered as part of future organisational planning.

SPRFMO Headquarters Arrangement

During 2021 and early 2022 the Executive Secretary held a series of meetings with New Zealand in their capacity as hosts of the SPRFMO premises, to discuss SPRFMO staff visa arrangements and the possibility of assistance with accepting certain overseas payments.

As informed to the FAC last year professional staff and their dependants are issued with official visas upon entry into New Zealand. These official visas expire after ten years and do not allow dependants to work in New Zealand. Previously the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade has assured the Secretariat that there was a process for changing visa status so that SPRFMO staff will be able to continue to work in New Zealand beyond 10 years.

Early in 2022 after researching the New Zealand immigration process, the Secretariat secured the services of an immigration expert to facilitate a change in visa status for one of the SPRFMO staff dependants. An application to change visa status was filed in early July 2022 and unfortunately the person involved is still awaiting a decision by New Zealand. This 6+ month delay has caused significant stress and frustration for the staff and her family. It is also concerning given that the upcoming similar status change for SPRFMO staff will necessitate the Secretariat attaining the status of an AEWV Accredited Employer with Immigration New Zealand (a new requirement that entered into force in 2022).

The fees associated with acquiring visas will be passed on to New Zealand as per the Headquarters Agreement.

In 2022, the Executive Secretary and the Finance and Office Manager met twice with representatives of the SPRFMO bank. New Zealand representation was requested (by the bank and the Secretariat) but was declined. As a result of the meetings no assurance was made but the circumstances of the SPRFMO was again highlighted, and the bank representatives did resolve to assess any new payments in this light. Since then, the Secretariat is not aware of any additional attempts to clear overdue payments and so we are unsure if the challenges with accepting certain overseas payments remain.

¹ Noting also that professional (non-New Zealand) staff are prevented from purchasing homes/land in New Zealand.

10. Fishery Statistics

The Secretariat has received the 2021 Annual Catch Reports from all Commission Members and CNCPs who fished in the SPRFMO Area in accordance with CMM 02-2022 (details are reported in COMM11-Inf01).

11. Communications Activities and Tasks

This section aims to provide an overview of the communications actions and activities taken up by the Secretariat during 2022, with a focus on dissemination and outreach.

- **UPGRADED WEBSITE**. The upgrade of the website platform has been finalised, and the Secretariat now is aiming to move towards developing the new website capacities for data and information visualisation, and data/reporting input.
- INTERNAL COMMUNICATION. In 2022, the Secretariat circulated **329 official letters**. General and Restricted communications, as well as a list of the SPRFMO Heads of Delegation, are made available on the Member pages of the website (login required). The communications sent out were split as follows:
 - o General Correspondence (G): **186** letters. General letters are addressed to the widest SPRFMO audience (Members, CNCPs, the Scientific Committee, and on some occasions, Observers). These letters are posted on the website and listed in the summary circulated every month.
 - o Direct Communication (DC): **132** letters. Direct Communications are addressed specifically to an individual (commonly the Head of Delegation) or SPRFMO contacts (e.g., for annual contributions).
 - Restricted Correspondence (R): 11 letters. Restricted correspondence is addressed only to the Heads of Delegation. These letters usually convey information relating to IUU fishing vessels, compliance issues, intersessional decisions, etc.
 - o Whatsapp: the Secretariat continues to use Whatsapp as a tool to sometimes communicate with some of the delegations that have issues with receiving emails from the Secretariat.

The Secretariat keeps making great efforts to keep official contact details up to date. In 2022, **32** updates of official contacts were received as per Rule 2.2 of the Rules of Procedure.




Figure 1. Visualization of the number of data files processed over the past three years. The vessel edits category was calculated in the same manner as for the 2022 summary; however, the figures for this category differ from past years (i.e., FAC9-Doc09_rev2 and FAC8-Doc08_rev1) as in the past, this category simply represented the number of unique vessels that had information edited within a given year. The methodology was modified this year to demonstrate the actual number of edits made within a year. This figure shows an increase in almost all data source categories over the past couple years, with 2022 representing an increase of approximately 230% in files processed as compared to 2020 (7,422 as compared to 3,198 in 2020).
