SPRFMO Report of Income

Secretariat

1. Background

Financial Regulation 4.11 provides that the “*Executive Secretary shall submit to each annual meeting of the Commission a report on the collection of annual contributions from Members, any voluntary contributions received, and any investment and other income received*”.

FAC11 is invited to:

- **note** the information contained in this document.

2. Report of Income

2.1. Annual Meeting contributions

In line with Financial Regulation 4.9 “*overdue contributions are considered to be in arrears the date after they are due and payable*”, i.e., after 90 days from the date the Executive Secretary informed Members of the annual contribution. In 2023, the Secretariat Informed Members of the annual contributions for SPRFMO on 31st of March 2023, which meant 30th of June 2023 was the due date for Member’s contributions for Financial Year 2023-24.

The Commission also agreed on the following interpretation of when a Member with two years' worth of contributions in arrears is precluded from participation in decision-making. Based on Article 15.9 of the Convention, read with Financial Regulation 4.9, such a Member would not be “in arrears with its payment of any monies owed to the Organisation by more than two years” until more than two years from the date a particular payment became in arrears, that is, two years and one day from the date that payment was due and payable, i.e., 731 days.

Table 1 below shows the invoiced contributions (in NZ\$) by financial year as well as the current balance of amounts in arrears and overpaid amounts as of 20 December 2023. If a Member has an overdue contribution amount then the final column shows how long those monies will have been in arrears as of the final date of the upcoming annual meeting (assuming that they are not paid prior, and the final date of the upcoming annual meeting is the 2nd February 2024).

¹ Belize's outstanding member contributions of NZ\$ 27,823 for previous financial years from 2013 to 2016 has been written off as bad debt as of 30 June 2016; Belize reacceded to the Convention on 22 February 2023. Article 15.8 of the SPRFMO Convention "A Contracting Party that becomes party to this Convention during the course of a financial year shall contribute in respect of that financial year a part of the contribution calculated in accordance with the provisions of this Article that is proportionate to the number of complete months remaining in the year from the date that the Convention enters into force for that Party", hence Belize's CNCP contribution for Financial Year 2022- 23 has been proportionate to 8 complete months, Member contribution for FY2022-23 has been proportionate to 4 complete months. (Ref: DC29-2023 Treatment of Belize's financial contribution to SPRFMO for 2022-23).

² China, Panama, Peru, USA, and Vanuatu acceded to the Convention after commencement of a financial year, thus only paid a portion of the annual contribution in respect of that financial year as per Convention Article 15.8.

³ Belize became a full Member of SPRFMO on 22 February 2023, its CNCP contribution for Financial Year 2022- 23 has been proportionate to 8 complete months. (Ref: DC29-2023 Treatment of Belize's financial contribution to SPRFMO for 2022-23).

⁴ Panama became a full Member of SPRFMO on 07 July 2022 and as per letter R07-2022 on Treatment of Panama's financial contribution to SPRFMO, Panama's CNCP voluntary contribution for Financial Year 2022-23 was proportionate to 1 complete month.

⁵ USA voluntary contribution USD\$10,000, to be used to support Secretariat efforts to carry out several actions instructed by the SPRFMO Finance and Administration Committee (FAC10, Para 49) relating to staff matters (DC68-2023 & GC137-2023) alongside the 3rd contribution of US\$ 100,000 under the SPRFMO-NOAA MoU.

⁶ In FY 2023-24, NZ\$ 24,557 is the amount of interest earned from the first 5 months of the year (from 1 July to 30 November 2023), including interests earned from the Investment Funds (3 term deposits), bank saving account, DS Fund, SC Fund, Contingency Fund, SPRFMO BNZ Operating Account.



2.3. Other recent voluntary contributions

European Union:

SI2.808674 – SPRFMO Regional Observer Programme (pre-financing of EUR 105,000 in FY2019-20).

This project was originally scheduled to finish during December 2021; however, the European Union has agreed to extend this project until 30th April 2025 and agreed to make the funding available for translation of relevant materials. This project continues to support payments to the SPRFMO accreditation assessor for their work assessing the applications against the SPRFMO Observer standard.

SI2.829333 – Support to the Scientific Process and Data Management in SPRFMO (pre-financing of EUR 87,500 in FY2019-20).

This project was originally scheduled to finish during December 2021; however, the European Union has agreed to extend this project until 30 June 2024. In addition to completed activities, funds from this project were used to support expert assistance with the 2023 MSE workshop in Manta, NZ\$16,957, equivalent to US\$10,457.

101058576 - Support to MSE for Jack mackerel in SPRFMO (pre-financing of EUR 42,000 in FY 2021-22).

This grant that was signed in June 2022 and had a project duration of 18 months. This action was to support scientific analysis and management in SPRFMO by further developing and implementing a Management Strategy Evaluation for Jack mackerel. Tasking for this activity has been completed by the SC members. The Secretariat is currently in the process of coordination to finalize it.

101089755 Science based decision making (pre-financing of EUR84,000, received FY 2022-23).

This grant was signed in August 2022 and has a project duration of 24 months. This grant has two objectives: The first objective will build on previous works conducted over several years to prevent the occurrence of significant adverse impacts on Vulnerable Marine Ecosystems (VMEs); The second objective will build on previous works to continue to develop and update SPRFMO's management of the Jack mackerel fishery. Two sub-tasks are to be supervised by the Deepwater working group and 3 sub-tasks will be supervised by the Jack mackerel working group. The timeline for this project is currently in SC's multi-annual workplan and the Secretariat is coordinating the activities with the relevant working groups.

China

Aforementioned "voluntary contributions - China FY2023-24" in Table 2.

In addition to its earlier contributions, China made a voluntary contribution of NZ\$25,202 for SC squid related research activities in July 2023. These new funds alongside the historic unused balance are currently available for collecting and analysing genetic samplings (Convention area and adjacent National Jurisdiction Areas) as per the Squid Connectivity item in the Scientific Committee Multi-Annual Plan.

United States of America

Aforementioned "voluntary contributions USA FY2023-24" in Table 2.

In September 2023, voluntary contribution from the USA for US\$10,000 (NZ\$16,940) was received to support Secretariat efforts to carry out several actions related to staff compensation and benefits policy tasked by the SPRFMO Finance and Administration Committee (FAC Para49⁷), at its 10th meeting in 2023, including that the internal Secretariat practices relating to the application of Staff assessment be independently reviewed against

⁷ **FAC10 Para49:** "Regarding the current conditions for General Services Staff the FAC recommended that the internal Secretariat practices relating to the application of Staff assessment be independently reviewed against the UN standard. the UN standard; that general services salaries are clearly and directly benchmarked with rates equivalent to those paid in Wellington for staff of equivalent qualifications and experience; and that independent legal advice is obtained on the Staff contracts..”

Under the Memorandum of Understanding between the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce, and the Secretariat, and in response to a proposed workplan, NOAA has provided a third contribution of US\$100,000 (NZ\$167,179). These funds will be used to primarily support the preparations and holding of the 11th Compliance and Technical and Committee meeting to be held in Manta, Ecuador in January 2024 including the Secretariat’s preparatory work, travel costs, and logistical support during the meeting. Secondly, the Secretariat will use a portion of the funding to evaluate the use of commercially available “rendezvous event” vessel data as a cross-referencing tool to aid in potential transshipment detection in the SPRFMO area.



3. An Overview of SPRFMO Income by Financial Year
